suppose their Majesties from the East are very busy these days preparing gifts for young and old alike, as they did more than two thousand years ago with that child who had just been born in a manger in little Bethlehem. Guided by a star, and like good astrologers, you knew how to find that family in the midst of the darkness and the cold. And according to Matthew's Gospel. you him worshipped and gave him gold, frankincense and myrrh.

So this is what I ask of you for our communities of Faith and Light in every corner of the world:

• THE MIRRA of authentic relationships, beyond appearances and conventions, made of gestures and details, gratitude and the ability to ask for forgiveness and to forgive, like a good oil that heals and repairs, that takes care of people and helps to strengthen bonds.

What I ask of you may be a lot, but we, the communities of Faith and Light, pledge to do our part to make it happen. Each person, whether they are from anywhere in the world, whether they have been in a community for a short or long time, whether they have a coordinating role or not, will do their best to make Faith and Light like gold, frankincense and myrrh for those who need to receive these gifts.

Finally, dear Magi, as you know, our Faith and Light communities are a bit like the family you met that night in Bethlehem, made up of that holy couple with their baby, a few animals and some shepherds. We don't make the headlines either and we don't have a lot of material resources. But we have the treasure of our friends with disabilities, who bring us closer to the heart of God.

As you know, that region, which was already experiencing violence and conflict in the time of Jesus, is still more or less in the same state. It seems unbelievable that after so many years, the same land that the child Jesus walked on is still suffering the death and terror of its inhabitants today, caused by bombs, bullets and the interests of both sides. And alongside them, other areas of the world continue to suffer from war, such as Ukraine and so many countries in Africa, Latin America and Asia. And violence in so many countries in the form of discrimination on any grounds, so many forms of abuse of women, so many "civilised" forms of control, subjugation and slavery. Forgetting those who suffer the most, supporting people with illnesses, our attitude towards so many groups who are left out.

May our communities be Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh for humanity.

shouted "We are the Pope's youth"!

The Way of the Cross was one of the most moving moments of the WYD. The Pope got us thinking about the world's problems, including war, unemployment, mental health and social media addiction. At the 12th station, we prayed that the elderly, the disabled, the unemployed and the dreamers should count as much as the active and productive members of society.

On Saturday, we took part in a music activity and a painting workshop, during which friends made a banner with the name of the movement.




Report in Portugal



s the motto of this WYD was "Mary arose and went in haste" (Luke 1:39), we also left in haste for the Parque Tejo, where almost a million and a half young people had gathered for several kilometres along the banks of the Tagus. We enjoyed a warm evening followed by a peaceful night under the stars. Some of our friends were worried: "What if it's cold? What if we didn't beds have enough for everyone? What if... what if... what if...". At the same time, expectations were high and it would be an unforgettable experience: more than a million people sleeping under the same sky created by God our Father! We woke up at around 7am to the music of the famous priest and DJ Padre Guilherme, who got everyone moving!

The high point was Sunday morning, with the Eucharist presided over by Pope Francis, а real celebration of communion and fraternity, where everyone shared the purest of things. Love. Everyone then sang and danced to the WYD anthem in several languages.

This adventure in Lisbon came to an end on Sunday, and we left with the Pope's words in our hearts: "Go and get everyone, young and old, healthy and sick, righteous and sinners: everyone, everyone, everyone". We went on pilgrimage to various shrines to return to the roots of Faith and Light. We visited the shrine of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Star of the New Evangelisation and that of Saint John Paul II in Torun. It was also a time of joint celebrations, conferences, adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, and a pleasant time over coffee in a pleasant atmosphere to share and remember what community means to each of us.







"Mat Jesus a Galiläa" Meeting Jesus in Galilee

Our coordinating team has launched a research project on the land of Jesus. We have located on a map the different regions, towns and villages mentioned in the stories of the Bible. The aim is also to learn about the customs, specialities, songs and dances...

In September, we introduced the theme for the year, "Meeting Jesus in Galilee". As the months go by, a Jesus figure will accompany us and all our meetings will include traditional songs and dances. Each time we try to place the context of the story on the map.

Materials: Candles from our community since 1984. Jesus figurine, fabrics, map of the Mediterranean countries. The October meeting was a joyful one, with everyone happy to be together again. Together, we created a floor chart using blue fabric for the Mediterranean. and green, brown and beige fabrics for the countries around it. We tried to place the names of the countries in the right place. Memories of holidays spent in one of these countries helped us to locate them better.



One question came up: how do you travel from Luxembourg to Israel?

By plane 5 hours, by car 45 hours and on foot 830 hours! We made a path from Nazareth to Jerusalem out of fabric, built Jesus' family home out of wooden blocks and put up an enlarged photo of the temple.

In the house we placed Jesus as an adolescent with Joseph and Mary. While a leader read the Gospel of Luke 2:41-51, the figurines were placed on the path with the people of the village.

<u>Materials</u>: Candle. Figurines of Jesus, Mary, Joseph, villagers. Blue, green, beige and brown fabrics. Map with the names of the Mediterranean countries. Wooden blocks. Photo of the Temple. Wooden boards.



In November, we explored the theme of Jesus' search for his way at the age of 30, when he withdrew into the desert to reflect and pray.

Meditation with the hands:

following the rhythm of his breathing, we prayed with the fingers of both hands: Je-sus Chris-tus.

We built the first part of our

painting on the floor. The river Jordan where Jesus was baptised by his cousin. The story is summarised with the figure of Jesus in the "water" of the Jordan.



Then the picture changes again: Lake Gennesaret and its surroundings. Brown, beige and green fabrics. Story from the Bible: Luke 5:1-11. We place the figures. They represent the people who come to see and listen to Jesus. He gets into the boat with Simon the fisherman and talks to the people. The net is thrown into the water near the boat. The net fills with fish. At the end of the story, each person takes a fish, colours it, writes their name on it and puts it back in the net.

<u>Action</u>: Everyone picks a fish from the net, looks at the name written on it and hands it back to its owner with a gesture or a friendly word. <u>Materials</u>: Candle. Cloth. Figu-

rines, wooden boat, net, panel representing fishermen, coloured paper fish.

Faith and Light celebrates the 30th anniversary of its birth in Croatia

n 14 October 2023, at the national shrine of Saint Mary in Marija Bistrica, around 700 members of the Croatian province gathered together. There were also many guests, members of Faith and Light from Slovenia, from L'Arche community - Korablja from Croatia and Barka from Slovenia, Brother Ulrich from Taizé and the vice international coordinator Angela Grassi. The highlight of the event was the Holy Mass celebrated by the Apostolic Nuncio Mgr Giorgio Lingua, while the Bishop of Sisak, Mgr Vlado Košić, addressed a message to the members of Faith and Light and the pilgrims.

People with disabilities and their friends from the Noa

community in Županja acted out the Gospel of Luke 11:27-28, other members of the community (families) joyfully took part in the ministry, singing and praying, and the Faith and Light chaplains concelebrated.

At the end of the Mass, Archbishop Giorgio Lingua, Pope Francis' emissary to Croatia, gave a closing address and blessed the people with disabilities, their relatives and friends, saying: "I greet you with the words of Pope Francis, spoken in the Vatican two years ago on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of the birth of Faith and Light in Lourdes, which corresponds to the beginning of your adventure. Pope Francis said: "From that moment, the Holy Spirit accompanied the journey of your Movement and many "Faith and Light" com-munities were born in many countries on the five continents, carrying a message of love and welcome. This message is the heart of the Gospel! It reminds us that any person, even and especially the smallest and frailest, is loved by God and has their place in the Church and in the world. It is "the Gospel of smallness", as St Paul reminds us when he writes to the Corinthians: "Consider your own call, brothers and sisters: not many of you were wise by human standards, not many were powerful, not many were of noble birth. But God chose

what is foolish in the world to shame the wise; God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong; God chose what is low and despised in the world, things that are not, to reduce to nothing things that are, so that no one might boast in the presence of God" (I Co 1, 26-29).

That's why all of you, members of Faith and Light, as well as your family and friends, carry the message and the heart of the Gospel: The Kingdom of Heaven belongs to the little ones. Remember one thing: Jesus on the cross was like many of you - suffering physically and spiritually. Imagine that he could no lon-





ger speak or walk, he was tied up, but he could still do one thing: Love! Even if circumstances prevent us from doing many things, nothing and no-one can stop us from loving. This is what Jesus whispered last: "Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do". Even as he was dying, he continued to love. So it is with these thoughts that I bless you. I bless each of you who is called to give what you are and what you have, remembering that nothing is insignificant if it is done out of love. I bless you, parents, who are called to bring out the inner beauty of your children, like God who looks not at appearance but at the heart. I bless you, dear friends, who are called to be close to those who suffer, showing them God's presence and his love. Through your love, everyone should encounter God's love.

The celebrations then continued with 4 communities from Zagreb who performed the creation and growth of Faith and Light in Croatia over the last 30 years.

The first Croatian community, created with the support of Faith and Light Slovenia, boarded the boat and other communities followed until the boat was full, under the protection of Jesus and Mary.

A mother, a person with disabilities and two young friends



People with disabilities from the Noa community in Żupanja, together with their friends, mimed the Gospel of Luke 11:27-28.

spoke about what it means to be part of the Faith and Light community: it means living in a community full of love, coming out of isolation, being accepted and knowing that you are not alone, being yourself, developing self-confidence, activating your potential, focusing on the things you can do, living in simplicity, discovering the spiritual beauty of people with disabilities, experiencing the closeness and love of God together, like one big family. Provincial chaplain of Faith and Light, Reverend Robert Jugović explained that when he was young, he didn't know how to approach people with disabilities. He was prejudiced against them, but that changed over the years, especially when he became a member of the Noa community. For him, Faith and Light is a heart that beats, rejoices and wants to feel close to others. Every community should be blessed by a priest who is not prejudiced, but who comes, sees and stays. Faith and Light is a great gift from God

to the whole world.

Angela Grassi, international vicecoordinator accompanying Croatia, passed on to everyone the words of cofounder Marie-Hélène Mathieu: "Make everything you do in life a celebration and a joy! Encouraged by these words, may all our imperfections and insignificance, wounds and weaknesses in Christ, be a place of encounter, love and joy!

Reunion of the Morning Star community

C apernaum, healing and freedom: the theme of the meeting highlighted the need for a faith that overcomes our daily limitations.

After a few songs, some weather reports and a snack, Brother Valentin (the community chaplain) read out the word of the month before the parents and some of the adults retired for a time of sharing.

Two questions fuelled this sharing: the first was to talk about the everyday events that can discourage us in our mission of evangelisation. The second was to name the people who carry us on a stretcher. The parents were able to discuss the difficulties experienced in the family or elsewhere when we are parents of a child who is different, but also our faith in Christ, which strengthens us in hope. According to the testimonies of some parents, Faith and Light enables both parents and children to take responsibility for themselves and to flourish. During this time, people with disabilities, scouts and some friends took part in the artists' workshop and prepared the mime (Mark 2:1-12). During the workshop, each person

drew the outline of their foot on a sheet of cardboard and cut it out. The foot-shaped sheets were laid out on the floor, forming a path at the end of which was a sheet bearing the inscription FAITH. Each member walked along the symbolic path of their faith in Jesus



Christ. Before the prayer that marked the end of the meeting, the mime on the healing of the paralytic helped us to understand that faith in Jesus allows many miracles to happen.

So it's with a strong and renewed faith that we look forward to meeting again in December to celebrate Christmas together. ■

When Providence guides us

A new community was born in the Pacific islands of Wallis and Futuna on 12 November 2023. We invite you to relive this adventure with us...



In December 2022, Armelle was on a 6-week pediatric mission to Wallis and Futuna, accompanied by her husband Jérôme and their four children. We were warmly welcomed by the people of Wallis and Futuna, and in particular by the parish of the village of AKA AKA, located in the Hahake district. During this first experience in the Pacific, we found out that people with intellectual disabilities stayed at home and rarely, if ever, went out. There is still a lot of stigma attached to intellectual disability on the islands of Wallis and Futuna...

On our return to France at the beginning of January 2023, our community « Enfants et Lumière » asked us to reflect on the Vice provincial coordinator (VPC) commitment and to give our response at the General Assembly on 25 February 2023. We took the time to reflect and went to a Retreat House called « La Neylière » to give our response...

What a surprise when we arrived to discover the names of the buildings on the sign!



At the time, we thought it was an amusing coincidence, but later that evening, Jérôme wondered whether it might be a call or a sign... it's hard to give an exact or scientific meaning to something that's just a matter of personal conviction. And what if we were called to go back to Wallis and Futuna to suggest the creation of Faith and Light... During the evening, Armelle in turn became aware of this call that we felt. The Faith and Light adventure in Wallis and Futuna was launched!

In the weeks that followed, other troubling coincidences

occurred. We were informed that the national gathering of Wallisians and Futunians living in metropolitan France was to be held at the Cuet sanctuary at the end of April, an hour from where we live. We went to the gathering and met Sister Malia, a Futunian, who gave us some valuable contacts on Wallis.

Another interesting story : our church is called Saint Pierre Chanel. Did you know that Saint Pierre Chanel is the patron saint of the Pacific? He died in Futuna in 1841... Finally, a few weeks before our departure for Wallis, two of our friends (who don't know each other) told us that they knew the new Prefect of Wallis and Futuna, who will take up his position at the end of August 2023...

With all these coincidences in mind, we decided to follow this red thread, like an Ariadne's thread...

We arrived in Wallis on 18 October after a 27-hour flight via Istanbul, Singapore and Nouméa, for a period of 3 and a half weeks. We were due to return to mainland France on 13 November. On the spot, our friend Albert, whom we had met on our first trip, welcomed us and got involved with us in this completely crazy project.

A few important dates

Saturday 21st October

The Prefect and his wife invited us to dinner. During the evening, we discussed the reasons for our presence in Wallis. The Prefect gave us the contact details of a member of the Territorial Assembly who might be interested in the Faith and Light proposal.

Monday 23rd October

We meet with Father Soane Malivao. Aware of the need and the merits of Faith and Light for the parishioners, he explained that it would take a long time to set up Faith and Light in Wallis and convince the families to come to such an event. He is also very busy and short of time... He needs a team to support him. We realised at that moment that it wasn't going to be as simple as we'd imagined... Perhaps the Faith and Light day wouldn't take place while we were there? Our spirits are low at the moment, but we're not giving up hope and we're continuing to follow the Thread...

Thursday 26 October

After several unsuccessful attempts by our friend Albert to organise a meeting with the elected member of the assembly, I decided to send her a Whatsapp message explaining the purpose of our request. Within 5 minutes, she replied: "see you this evening at 5pm at the assembly"! We took the time to explain the foundations of Faith and Light. She realized that we would only be in Wallis for a short time and felt that this day should take place before we left.

Sunday 29th October

We had a meeting with Father Malivao, Albert and Noella, vice-president of the Handicap Federation, who had joined us in the adventure, to see the progress in the project.



To our great surprise, Father Malivao decided to set the date for the first Faith and Light Day on 12 November 2023, the day before our departure!

Week of 30 October to 3rd November

We flew to Futuna, 250 km from Wallis, for 5 days. The very next day, we were welcomed by a dozen people representing physical disability associations on Futuna. The testimony of what we experience at Faith and Light was echoed in our discussions. The president of the disability federation was delighted with the proposal and introduced us to Father Félicé, who was already involved in the area of disability. Finally, the local television station contacted us to plan an interview about Faith and Light. The team decided to organise an information day on 15 December on the subject, with a view to launching the first Faith and Light Day in Futuna in January 2024.

Week of 4 November to 11th November

Father Malivao, Albert, Noella and ourselves contacted families concerned by intellectual disability and invited them to come and take part in the day. We made the sign representing the "Weather forecast of the heart" and planned the logistics to make the day a success!

12 November 2023

It's the big day! We welcomed 30 people, including 7 families with intellectual disabilities. After an explanation of the day's program, the weather forecast followed, then a time for miming the Gospel, deep sharing with the parents, and during the meal we enjoyed Wallisian dances... We had a wonderful day... And the next one is scheduled for 10 December!

For our reflexion, Ghislain du Chéné

52 years of joy

In many marvellous tales, there is an unavoidable character, the fairy, who leans over the cradle of newborn babies to distribute gifts. The gift that Faith and Light received from the first pilgrimage in 1971 was joy. Pilgrims could not help but sing in the streets of Lourdes: Amis chantons notre joie (Friends, let us sing our joy) from Good Friday onwards! And this gift has never left us. In July, in Strasbourg, Marie-Hélène Mathieu gave participants in the international meeting this good advice: "Transform everything you do into joy!"



We were messengers of joy for the 40th anniversary pilgrimages in 2011 and 2012, and this joy is truly an integral part of our identity. In the document that defines it (approved at the 2018 meeting in Lebanon), we read: Through various activities (celebrations, sharing, prayer, retreats, trai-

ning, etc.) that are a source of joy, we learn to welcome and accept our frailties and find rest, consolation and healing.

How might we define our joy which we have received as a gift - in each of our communities? People with disabilities are often referred to by the Hebrew word anawim, which means the poor in spirit, those who cannot manage on their own. It can also be translated as "the bent over". Jesus healed a woman who was all "bent over and absolutely unable to stand up straight" (Lk 13:11). We can easily imagine the joy of this woman after this beautiful encounter with Jesus. This joy is also ours when we see our friends or children with disabilities who are given the best place in our parishes, in our meetings: they realise that they are important and the smile that lights up their faces is extraordinary! Their joy is not an exuberant display, but a beautiful smile that lights up their face. Their joy is not loud laughter - like those who laugh at jokes that are often inappropriate and designed to mock, belittle and humiliate those for whom they are intended but a transformation that makes them beautiful! We never say that Jesus laughed, but we can easily imagine him with a beautiful, broad smile.

It is one of the nine fruits of the Spirit (cf. Gal 5:22), second only to love. We must pass it on by announcing our joyful news, for as the Psalm 15 says: "In your presence there is fullness of joy" And if our joy overflows, we will easily be able to announce it: for what the mouth speaks is what overflows from the heart (Lk 6:45).

To conclude, I'm going to tell you a secret... I think that the fairy who bent over the cradle of Faith and Light to give it the gift of joy has the initials MHM!

Danny, a member of the Faith and Light community in Geelong, Australia, came into the light on 7 August 2023.


One of the first things he taught us was that communication is much more than just talking.

Marie-Hélène's letter



Godparents, «guardian angels»

we neglect precious gifts because we know them poorly, or not at all.

On the invisible side, I am thinking of the guardian angels that the Lord has placed beside each of us, and of whom Jesus declared: "I tell you, the angels of these little ones always see the face of my Father in heaven" (Mt 18:10). At baptism - the most important moment in our lives when we become children of God - the Church suggests that children be surrounded by a godparent. Without replacing them, they are like guardian angels, flesh and blood, responsible for helping parents in their task of educating children in the faith and supporting their godchild in his or her spiritual growth. In Latin, they are called "patrini, matrini" (little father, little mother), and in English "godfather, godmother" (father in God, mother in God). These words signify the spiritual paternity or maternity conferred on them.

Gone are the days when you were morally obliged to choose a godfather and godmother from the family line according to a precise order, which they had to accept. Nowadays, godparents are chosen more for reasons of sympathy, camaraderie or friendship... Sometimes business connections, wealth or notoriety are also favoured...

How can we ensure that this treasure is not wasted? What criteria should we use to choose our child's godparents? If a child has a disability, he or she will need faithful support, attentive to the spiritual life, more than others. Often parents simply raise the issue with the prospective godparent, leaving them free to refuse if they feel too helpless or unfit for the responsibility.

Another question that needs to be asked here:

"Can a disabled person be asked to be a godparent? How can we go beyond the "accidental", their disability, to reach the essential: the "reality" of their faith, their capacity for commitment and true relationships? In his case, as in that of any other person, it's not a question of pleasing, restoring confidence or even helping the godparent to better discover



their faith. That's not insignificant, but the essential thing is to offer the baptised person a witness, a faith 'awakener', a discreet companion capable of providing real spiritual support if the parents were to disappear.



Some parents might feel guilty thinking: "We chose our children's godparents for reasons that were too human. We didn't ask the Holy Spirit for help".

For their part, some godparents will reproach themselves for the superficiality of their "yes", which did not involve a deep commitment on their part, hence their lack of fidelity over the years.

But "God's gifts are irrevocable". This precious, reciprocal gift that the godparents are for the child and that the child represents for them, is a gift for life. Every day, the Lord invites us to do new things. Perhaps he is inviting each of us, godfather or godmother, to rediscover the meaning of our forgotten commitment to our godchild? It won't be a question of spectacular gestures, but of small steps that will bring us closer to him or her. And even if the links seem broken, there is still the grace of prayer, which allows us to ask for the Lord's protection and blessing on the person entrusted to us on the day of his or her baptism.

Message from Pope Francis December 2023



People with disabilities are among the most fragile among us. Some of them suffer rejection, rooted in either ignorance or prejudice, which then marginalizes them. Civil institutions need to support their projects through access to education, employment, and places where they can express their creativity.

Programs and initiatives are needed that promote their inclusion. Above all else, big hearts are needed who want to accompany.

It means changing our mentality a

little and opening ourselves to the abilities and talents of these people who are differently abled, both in society as well as in the life of the Church.

And so, creating a completely accessible parish does not only mean eliminating physical barriers. It also assumes that we stop talking about "them" and start talking about "us." Let us pray that people with disabilities may be at the center of attention in society, and that institutions offer inclusion programs that enhance their active participation.
