THE **ENCOUNTER** OF BENJAMIN COSTE

Éric Signoret

Heart of Pierre

New President of Faith and Light France, he was "converted" by his son Pierre, who suffers from a severe disability.

Éric Signoret laughs very often. Talking about himself before the birth of Pierre, the youngest of his seven children, he laughs: "I was a careerist, always looking for my marshal's baton! Ambition took him to the four corners of France, with his "holy" wife Elisabeth agreeing to follow him from Marseille to Picardy, before the family finally settled in Lyon in 1991, his birthplace.

At each stage, the family grew while he turned around companies in difficulty, trying to satisfy their shareholders. In 1996, Pierre was born. It took six years for the medical profesdiagnose sion to "difference": he had Angelman syndrome, "a very severe mental deficiency", explains his father. Soon to be in his thirties, Pierre has "the cognitive abilities of a child of only 2 or 3 years of age", continues Éric Signoret.

Faced with his son's illness, he explains that for a long time he was in denial.

You can be happy despite the disability: be authentic, just as you are. >>

"He was our youngest, his behavioural problems weren't yet a problem. My wife carried everything during those early years," he confesses, paying tribute to the woman to whom he has been married for forty-two years.

For a long time, performance was his obsession. "I used to ski competitively. Mountaineering too, so much so that my wife used to tell me I had a mistress: the mountains!" laughs the lively septuagenarian, honed by the hourlong run he puts in every day. "I always have to try to do better than the last time. Even at my age!" laughs the man whose tendonitis is forcing him to rest these days. With regard to Pierre, Éric Signoret says he has "gradually come out of denial. And Foi et Lumière has had a hand in that". Once again, his wife put him on the right path: to Lourdes for the last Faith and Light international pilgrimage, in 2001. "To say I went there without enthusiasm would be an understatement," recalls the father of the family, then aged 47, sacrificing another mountain run for the occasion. "Lourdes was at odds with my values at the time. During the pilgrimage, however, he was to experience the three stages described by Mother Teresa in relation to the disabled person: "repulsion, compassion and then wonder", he quotes. He also became "aware that we can be joyful despite our disability: we can be authentic, just as we are". The result was a fatherly bond that was finally established: "Pierre became my son again, and I his father," he says, suddenly serious.

On their return from Lourdes, the Signorets approached a Faith and Light community in their home town of Lyon. "We just wanted to thank them... and we never left them!" says the father of the family. He and his wife were seduced by "the joy, the games, the possibility of letting go" of the monthly meetings. Without idealising disability, which "remains a source of suffering", the new president of Faith and Light France (1) now believes that "the fragility of our children shapes us. Sometimes I feel like Zacchaeus: my Peter is Christ saying to me, 'Today I want to stay with you.

Claire, my sister...

y sister Claire, you are 40 years old.

It seems we look alike. I must admit that I have often wished that we were more similar. I wish you could climb the cherry tree with me.

I would have liked us to tell each other stories and confidences in cabins made of cushions and fabrics.

I wish we would have run away through the streets and hills until the sun went down. I would have liked us to play for hours with cards, dice and pawns of all colours.

But you, my sister, are not like the other little sisters. With you, I grew up differently than the other big sisters. We spent more time playing cards, with clubs, spades, hearts, than playing monopoly!

Claire, I'm grateful to you for developing this passion. A collection with endless variations, gifts that are easy to make and attention that is easy to capture. It's a fun way to connect with you. Games and good times are at the heart of life.

So thank you! You taught me that you could invent the rules of the games yourself. And life is much funnier when you know that.

With you, I learned to denounce the norm before I was even aware that it existed.

It started with the common

mockery in the playground, which was totally incomprehensible to me. Excluding for a lock of hair, for a brand of clothing, for an accent was already a complete absurdity for me, your big sister. It's obvious that we are all different, right? Why do you want to be normal?

With you, between two climbs, I also learned to lay down under the cherry tree. Who has ever looked at a tree from below? Observe the wonderful and fascinating world of changing light, rustling leaves, infinite variations of blues and greens.

I thank you for each of these magical moments. I thank you for the contemplation.

What a walk we took together! You in front, me behind. Your pace is much slower than mine. I tune into your tempo and I pay attention to what catches your attention.

You rarely look in the expected direction.

A detail in the architecture, a half-torn poster, the flight of a bird or something invisible. Sometimes I have wondered for what captured your gaze so intensely. At home, they said that you saw angels. It made me proud. My sister has superpowers. You can see things that are invisible to others.

Maybe it's an angel? My sister has superpowers! You can see things, that is invisible to me. I want you to know that I am still walking around with my nose in the air, looking for a detail that might grab my attention.

With you, I learned that we don't always need words to understand each other. Take hands. Look at each other. A long time. Eye to eye. Be fully connected. Watch the world. Observe. Without ever judging. Words sometimes distract us from what is essential. I feel that you are very close to the essential.

Claire My sister, you are 40 years old. And I know that I am not the only one in this beautiful assembly that you have made grow. I'm not the only one you taught essential things. The ones that really matter, all those beautiful things in us, the ones that make us all the same.

Claire's commitment

On the occasion of her 40th birthday, Claire, a member of our community, made a commitment. She writes in facilitated communication, here is her moving and enlightening message about her state of life.

40 years old, Claire. February 11, 2024, my commitment.

My name is Claire, I really like Saint Claire and I would have liked to become a Poor Clare. But when you are disabled, many doors close.

I long for Heaven, I know that one day Saint Clare will take me in her arms and all disability and suffering will end. In the meantime, how can I live my desire to be a nun without living in a convent?

It is in my great solitude, in this space that I receive Jesus. He consoles me, he doesn't want me to be sad or angry about my damaged condition and says to me: "you are my friend. I can join you in your difficulties, I too have experienced a lot of rejection and incomprehension." My Ioneliness is diminished by His faithful presence at my side. And then, I have the grace to converse with loved ones who have already left before me: my brother Pierre, my boyfriend Pascal, my friend Rémi and my old friend Valère who gave me the icon of Mena and Jesus.

My space of solitude has not become a convent, but rather a hermitage. The educators turn on my computer, with mass in the morning and the rosary with Our Lady of Light in the evening.





Two moments that immerse me in prayer and strengthen my friendship with Christ. So today, I commit to this life of mine, with the help of God.

I no longer want to endure it, but to consent to this life and perhaps one day love it.

I sometimes feel so weak and depressed that without God I could no longer smile.

Today I want to repay Him for all the good He has done for me, by getting closer to Him with devotion.

Forty years is a step, a turning point and I want to say: yes Lord, here I am! ■

Report in Norway

Together we form a big international family



The day began with a religious service after which our community gathered together. A little over twenty people with disabilities as well as families and friends were present. We formed a circle in the center of which was

placed a beautifully embroidered white lace veil on which we placed a few rose petals around the great light of Christ. All around were candles.

After the welcome song, we mimed the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple. Jan Torvald (the host) had put on his tunic and stole to

become the character of Simeon, the one who was waiting for the Messiah. Seeing and listening to them, we were all immersed in the story. At the end of the mime, Jan concluded with these few words: "Now I carry the one who carries me." Simeon carries the child Jesus who carries us all. And we sang the song "Jesus, son of God, light in me".

Then Kristin reminded us that the Feast of Light was celebrated at the same time all over the world. Together, we form a large international community born 53 years ago and which has grown over the years. Then she took a glass full of marbles and gradually spilled them. Report in Poland

The Szezecin community celebrates its 40 years.

When should you wish the Faith and Light's anniversary?

his Easter, we celebrate 53 years of Faith and Light. It's no secret that we love celebrating anniversaries in our communities, but what day should we choose for our movement's birthday?

It is often said that Faith and Light was born during a pilgrimage to Lourdes from 9 to 12 April 1971, from Good Friday to Easter Monday. Our founders told us that on the last day they answered a question from the pilgrimage leaders, who were worried about what to do next: "Continue to meet up in your community, and we'll see where the Holy Spirit wants to take us".

So should we be wishing ourselves a birthday on the day after Easter, rather than on Easter Day? Or on 12 April?

But there was another event during this pilgrimage that really struck a chord; on Good Friday, at the end of the first large gathering, the pilgrims enthusiastically sang the pilgrimage song, which had not been planned before the Easter Vigil, because it was full of alleluias. And the word "alleluia" became a password for all the pilgrims until the end of the pilgrimage. (See Marie-Hélène Mathieu's book "Never again alone").

A few years ago, I was reminded of the beautiful story of the "alleluias" that burst forth spontaneously on Good Friday, when we should have reserved this acclamation to celebrate the resurrection of Christ at the Easter Vigil, an acclamation all the more beautiful for having prepared it by concentrating our energy during the 40 days of Lent. Five years ago, someone in my community, who is used to experiencing the Passion narratives read on Palm Sunday and Good Friday with rare intensity (so much that a priest in our parish was struck and reminds me regularly), said to me at the end of the Good Friday service with a big smile: "That's it, now he can rise again!" It's almost as if she didn't sing Hallelujah!

Jesus told the apostles so many times, as he



did after the Transfiguration, but they didn't quite understand: they wondered among themselves what it meant to "rise from the dead" (cf. Mk 9:10).

The birth of Jesus had already been celebrated nine months earlier on 25 March, the feast of the Annunciation, so why not start celebrating the Resurrection three days earlier? And recognise the prophetic nature of the inspired intuitions of Faith and Light?

The statue of the Pieta by Michelangelo, which can be admired at the entrance to the Basilica of Saint Peter in Rome, shows Mary holding the body of Christ on her knees as he is taken down from the Cross and laid in the tomb. Mary's face expresses no sadness, no doubt because Christ's face expresses no suffering. She is probably saying to herself: "That's it, now he can rise again", having understood the penultimate words of her Son on the Cross: "It is finished" (Jn 19:30).

So, happy birthday, Faith and Light! And as we like celebrations that last several days, let's not hesitate to celebrate our birthday from Good Friday until Easter Monday, with lots of Alleluias!

On Saturday 15 June 2024, people with disabilities are inviting the public to a major celebration that is completely free and open to all.

Now in its 7th year, The Disability Night will be celebrated in over thirty towns and cities. and will be sponsored by the young comedian Valentin Reinehr.

While disability directly affects 12 million people in France (80% of whom are invisible), the gap between people with and without disabilities is still very wide. The Disability Night is a festive and friendly way of breaking down these barriers. Bringing people together, breaking down stereotypes, revealing the talents and richness of people with disabilities... These are the aims of the Disability Night, modelled on the Festival of Music. For a few hours, hundreds of anonymous people showcase their cultural, artistic and sporting talents... The difference is that it is people with disabilities, who are all too invisible, marginalised and isolated for the rest of the year, who are inviting the public to celebrate with them.

Valentin Reinehr, a young comedian with a stammer whom the public discovered on "France has a big talent" and sponsor of the Disability Night 2024, shares this sentiment: "As stammering is considered a disability, I'm very sensitive to this cause. The Disability Night should happen every day, not just once a year". The first edition in 2018 was a huge

Each town will have its own programme, with a single watchword: celebration! Workshops, events. shows and drinks, the public can meet up, chat, get to know each other. create links and contribute to a more caring world.







Marie-Hélène's letter



Reconciling isn't easy

First of all, we need to reconcile ourselves with reality. We are more or less at odds with it, since it no longer coincides with our legitimate plans. Reality is the little child we're holding in our bodies or minds, a child who doesn't conform to the one we'd dreamed of, who was full of life and resources, capable of achieving everything that events and our limitations have prevented us from doing in our lives.

Our child is there, different, disappointing, but a unique person whose destiny hangs in the balance. Will the call of his heart make the ghost that stands between him and us and prevents us from meeting disappear?

The reality with which we are also invited to come into harmony is those around us. All those close to us: the one who doesn't support us as much as we need and the one who has let us down completely; the one who has offended us and the one we have offended and no longer dare to look at. Jesus even asks us to start with him: "If your brother has something against you, go and find him...". He also tells us: "Love your enemies, for if you love your friends, you do nothing extraordinary, just as the pagans do. But if you love your enemies, you will be perfect, like God your Father...".

Reconciling with ourselves is not the easiest thing. We are so unhappy about our weaknesses, our limitations, our handicaps, our pride, so prone to condemn ourselves and to imagine that the trial is only the price we have to pay for our faults... We have to learn to bear with ourselves patiently as a "poor suffering member of the Mystical Body". And we must also reconcile ourselves with the small resurrections of our lives, because sometimes we are in such a state of sulkiness that we do

not accept the slightest improvement, the slightest progress, because it is not total enough and not what we expected.

"If your heart condemns you, God is greater than your heart". To accept this mercy and tenderness of God for us... Finally, it is with him that we must first reconcile ourselves. We tend so easily to distance ourselves from God in times of trial, as if he were ultimately responsible for them. We need to relax. Relax in him. For it is he who first loved us, and it is he who always takes the initiative in love and reconciliation. His patience is tireless, but to reconcile, both parties must agree. Dialogue must therefore be accepted. Even if it's in the manner of Job, by crying out our distress and bitterness. God will take care of the rest. One day, he will make us understand that our heart was made for him and that it cannot find peace until it rests in him.

Reconciling with our child as he is, as he can become. With ourselves, weak and sinful but saved and called to be saints if we respond to the Lord's call. With our lives, which, like Jesus', are marked by death and resurrection.

Easter: Message from Don Marco Bove

"Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen. " (Lk 24,5-6)

n Easter morning, near the tomb, the angels of the resurrection said to the women: Why do you search among the dead...? In the course of our lives, there are many situations in which we too run the risk of searching among the dead: when we no longer know what to do and have lost all hope, when something important for us suddenly ends or someone has left us forever.

Searching among the dead means looking in the wrong place or in the wrong way for something or someone we can't live without...

The angels of the resurrection, on the other hand, announce in a surprising and unexpected way that Jesus has risen, that he is alive forever, that he will never die again. Death is not the last word in our lives, even if it continues to frighten us.



So here is the Easter proclamation that reaches us once again: Jesus is alive, life is stronger than death. There is hope for us and for all those who are suffering at the moment, for those who have lost faith in their present and their future, for those who are victims of hatred and war, and for those who are faced with loneliness and anguish.



As our Faith and Light communities move forward, let us ask the Lord to be like the angels of the resurrection, to proclaim hope and to be witnesses to the prophecy of love, especially in the most difficult and hopeless situations.

The Lord is risen, death is conquered, life blooms anew.
